Why do we wear poppies?



Poppies are the flowers which grew on the battlefields after World War One ended, and they are used to remember those who have given their lives in battle.

This is described in the famous World War One poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

In Flander's Fields In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flander's fields. Take up our guarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, tho poppies grow In Flander's fields. HOWARD SCHMIDT

Howard was born on February 11, 1923.

He joined the Canadian Army on June 21, 1943 and served with the South Saskatchewan Regiment in United Kingdom and Continental Europe (England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany) during WWII.

He was wounded July 20, 1944 and returned to service in France a few months later. He was wounded a second time December 16, 1944 on the Holland border and returned back to the Regiment in March, 1945 until the war ended. He returned to Halifax on the Queen Elizabeth ship with the South Saskatchewan Regiment in November, 1945 and from there, boarded the train to Weyburn, SK where they disbanded. He was discharged January 5, 1946.

He was awarded the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star, Canadian Voluntary Service Medal with clasp and the George VI Medal on discharge.

Later, he received the Normandy Campaign Medal, Thank You Canada Medal from Holland, Normandy Chest Badge 2004, and WWII 75th Tribute Pin (1939-2014).


Most recently, he was presented with the French Legion of Honour Medal for his service during WWII.

Howard has been an active member of the Weyburn branch of the Royal Canadian Legion No. 47 for the past 58 years.














Dahlton Lewis


