









He attended the Wymark EMC Church, where he was also baptized. Isaac and his sister, Eva, lived on the farm and cared for their mother until her passing in 1993. Isaac enjoyed farming and took great care of his land. He enjoyed family gatherings and traveling to visit relatives. Even though he was very soft-spoken, he enjoyed the company of others. Due to his failing health, he moved to Cypress House in Swift Current where he made some new friends. Isaac became bolder in his faith and shared it openly with those around him.

Isaac is survived by his sister, Justine Antal; his sisters-in-law, Tiena Hildebrand and Joyce Hildebrandt; as well as by many nephews, nieces, and their families. He was predeceased by his parents, Peter & Elizabeth Hildebrandt; his siblings, Eva Hildebrandt, Peter Hildebrandt, Mary Wieler, Helen Wieler, Henry Hildebrandt, Elizabeth Bennett, Jake Hildebrandt, and John Hildebrandt; numerous brothers & sisters-in-law; and by several nephews.

Larry Oakman Obituary


Larry Dale Oakman, 81, formerly of Stewart Valley, passed away peacefully at Cypress House care home in Swift Current on March 4, 2024. Larry was born on April 15, 1942, the youngest of three children, and grew up on the family farm east of Stewart Valley. Music was a big part of Larry's life. He sang and played various instruments including guitar, mandolin, and drums. He began by playing with his parents at dances and played in bands with many other friends. From 1961 to 1985 he played drums and sang backup with the Art Wallman band,



traveling for miles around in all kinds of weather to play for weddings and community dances. In later years he especially enjoyed singing with his daughter Lesley, and together they brought many smiles and toe-taps to care homes and community events. Larry married the love of his life, Merrilyn (Lyn) Hunter, on June 15, 1968, and they began farming his grandfather's homestead west of Stewart Valley. They raised two children, Darren and Lesley, in a loving home, giving them both roots and wings and the confidence to do anything they put their minds to. Larry was active in the community in many ways, including serving as General Leader of the North Star 4-H Club, serving on the Stewart Valley history book committee, and leading hymn sings at the Stewart Valley United Church. In 2004 he and Lyn sold the cattle herd and they were able to spend more time travelling across western Canada, Ottawa, the USA, and Ireland. In 2010 they celebrated the 100th year of the family farmstead, then in 2011 retired into Swift Current. Health problems for both soon limited their planned retirement travels. After several years of battling cancer, Lyn passed away in April 2017, then Lesley was also diagnosed with cancer and passed away in January 2020. In mid-2023 Larry's health sharply declined and he moved into the Cypress House care home, where he passed away. Larry was predeceased by his parents Ernie & Agnes Oakman, sister Barb Lopeter and her husband Richard, wife Lyn, and daughter Lesley. He leaves to mourn son Darren and his wife Desiree, and granddaughter Catharine, of Houston Texas; brother Brian (Joyce) of Swift Current; sister-in-law Carol (Howard) Clark of Regina; several nieces and nephews, and many friends. Rooted in Truth: A Devotion in the Ten Commandments



God's Instructions for Life

The Ten Commandments are a summary of the entire old covenant law (Eugene Merrill). It is as if, in these ten commands, God gave bullet points to His people that encapsulated the heart of His covenant with them. They were God's instructions for the lives of His old covenant people and continue in their relevance for us today.

In our use of the Ten Commandments, we will be following the format of the reformer Martin Luther. Luther would use the Ten Commandments for instruction, asking how this particular command might teach him and apply to his life. He would then give thanks based on the instruction that he had pulled from the command.

Next he would confess the sins that the command might bring to light. And finally he would turn these concepts to prayer. We will do the same. (This devotional has been generally influenced by Martin Luther, John Calvin, John Frame, and Ron Mehl.)

As we look at the Ten Commandments, there are a couple of things that we must remember. First, we must always remember that we are in a different place in redemptive history. As the charter of the old covenant, the law has passed away with the coming of the new covenant (1 Cor 9:20; Gal 3:23-26). But the law is also inspired Scripture, and Scripture never loses its relevance—even if the situation in which it was initially given no longer applies (Schreiner, Gentry/Wellum, Rosner, Garrett). As Scripture, God still uses His law in our lives even now.

Second, we are not made right with God by obeying the law, but through faith in Jesus (Rom 3:28)! The law was designed by God to point us to Jesus. So as we move through the Ten Commandments and look at practical applications of them, we must never forget the most important point that God is teaching us through them. In the overall flow of Scripture, we are being taught by these commandments that we are sinners and need a Savior. They teach us that we cannot live up to God's standards and so we need to turn in faith to Jesus and the cross.

There are so many things in our troubled world that rob us of peace, and we don't have to look far to find them.

There are the recent wars, earthquakes, famines and other disasters both natural and caused by man and so many people displaced, hurting, broken, dying.

And those are just the things happening outside of us. What about our personal struggles? Conflict in our families and relationships? The insidious presence of mental illness?


There's so much going on in the world, and it can be overwhelming. Whether we're struggling with troubles in our own lives or feeling the barrage of bad news everytime we look at the headlines, peace can feel elusive – if not impossible.

"How can we feel peace with everything going on?"

I'm sure the disciples asked this question when Jesus told them He would be leaving. They'd followed Him faithfully for three years and now, it was all about to change. We can imagine they were feeling confused, anxious, and overwhelmed. Jesus said to them, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" (John 14:27).

What did Jesus mean, when He promised peace? Surely He knew that the disciples, like us, were overwhelmed by everything going on. Was it an empty promise, or can we really find peace while living in our troubled world?







